

# CEO MESSAGE

2020 proved to be one of the most challenging years for our communities and the members we serve. Many historians ranked this past year among the top 10 most stressful years in U.S. and world history. While the pandemic caused disruption in our lives, our dedicated employees pushed through, making sure safe, reliable and affordable electric service was provided to our members throughout the year. In order to rise up to the pandemic challenges, Singing River Electric (SRE) was forced to alter many of our daily work processes and upgrade some facilities.

To further complicate matters, 2020 brought numerous severe weather events to our service area including: four tornadoes, one tropical storm and two hurricanes. Like you would expect, our employees stepped up by safely and efficiently restoring power outages following each event. Category 3 Hurricane Zeta presented the greatest challenge, as this late season storm caused outages for 82% of our members. Zeta's winds resulted in property damages in north Jackson, George, and Greene counties comparable to, if not worse, than what was experienced in these areas during Hurricane Katrina.

We are aware the need for reliable, **high-speed internet service** or broadband increased during the pandemic. For this reason, our board of directors and management team continued to study the possibility of providing this essential service for our members. In January 2021, Singing River Electric announced a plan to build its

first fiber project consisting of a 400-mile fiber ring connecting all SRE substations and offices and three fiber-to-the-home pilot projects. The fiber ring will bring additional value to our members by transmitting real-time information from our substations to our offices, thus minimizing outage response times.

# Singing River Electric will continue to remain focused on providing our members with safe, reliable and affordable electric service.

Participation of SRE members in this pilot project will give our board direction on future broadband expansion to other areas. Our subsidiary, Singing River Connect, was recently formed and will begin accepting fiber service pre-registrations for the first pilot area within the next month.

Looking ahead, Singing River Electric will continue to **remain** focused on providing our members with safe, reliable and affordable electric service. Additionally, we will continue supporting the communities we serve through programs that provide education, assistance and value to our members.

## COVID-19 PANDEMIC

As the Coronavirus spread across our nation, SRE put its plan in place to keep our communities powered while protecting our members and employees. Electricity is a critical need service, especially during a pandemic. Singing River Electric suspended disconnections, kept the drive-up windows open, installed protective barriers in lobbies, purchased hand sanitizer and masks, and powered on.







#### **Drive-up open**

While closing our lobbies temporarily, Singing River Electric member service representatives assisted members through the drive-up window, by phone and online to social distance during the height of the pandemic.

#### **Making masks**

SRE retirees, employees and their families volunteered to make masks for neighbors and healthcare workers. The cloth masks were necessary as there was a shortage of masks at the time for front line workers, first responders and those in our local communities.

### Drive-up annual meeting

SRE held an outdoor, driveup annual meeting, which was a first in the co-op's 82-year history. Attendees and employees masked up and wore gloves, meeting registration was done touch free using iPads, and voting and motions were made by honking horns. It was well attended and well received.

### NHN Grants to first responders

SRE diverted community grants for the month of May directly to local first responders to purchase personal protective equipment.

Donations were made to City of Lucedale Police and Fire Departments/George County Sheriff's Department, Jackson County Emergency Services and Greene County

Emergency Management.







SRE, in conjunction with wholesale provider Cooperative Energy, Coast Electric, Dixie Electric and Yazoo Valley Electric, participated in this community event. SRE employees answered the call for service by spending 10 hours cleaning flower beds and trimming trees at Greene County High and Leakesville Elementary and by serving lunch and cleaning facilities at Our Daily Bread in Pascagoula.


Supporting STEM summer camps

Funds were raised, and the home was built, but team participation was limited by COVID-19. Activities included a wall-signing event and raising awareness with a Virtual Build Day.



# STORM

**6 MUTUAL AID TRIPS** One of the many benefits of cooperative membership is responsive service following a storm. This is due to the dedicated, highly trained and safety-minded SRE employees, and is assisted by the mutual aid of co-op manpower from across the state and if necessary – across the nation. Twenty-four electric co-op, contract and right-of-way crews assisted power restoration following Hurricane Zeta. Four crews traveled from Illinois. The mutual aid of additional cooperative crews allows Singing River Electric to quickly ramp up manpower and achieve dramatically faster restoration following large storms.

In addition to receiving assistance in 2020 for Hurricane Zeta, SRE crews responded to five calls for help from electric co-ops in our state following tornadoes, winter storms and hurricanes. SRE also assisted in Louisiana following Hurricane Laura.





Singing River Electric crews restored power to members following four different tornado events in 2020. The first took place in the Piave community on February 10, followed by one in George County on March 31. Repairs were made amid the pandemic with staggered crews. April brought more severe weather with tornadoes in Greene County on April 12, as well as three EF-1 tornadoes that tore through George and Greene counties on April 23.



**HURRICANES** 

Singing River Electric crews responded to outages from two hurricanes in 2020 - Sally and Zeta. Hurricane Sally made landfall over Gulf Shores, Ala., in the early morning hours of September 16. Effects were felt as far west as southeast Mississippi, SRE crews worked into the night on Wednesday only to be called in due to high winds. At the peak, SRE had 9,522 meters out. SRE linemen, aided by contract and right-of-way crews, were able to restore power to all accessible by land the following day.



TROPICAL STORM

Tropical Storm Cristobal made an early season entrance on June 7. Only the third named storm in 2020, Cristobal knocked out power to 10,385 SRE meters or 14% of the co-op membership. Crews replaced nine broken poles and five transformers throughout the night. Winds gusted to nearly 60 miles per hour at times.



#### PILOT FIBER PROJECTS

SR Connect's three fiber pilot projects have the potential to serve nearly 2,000 fiber subscribers in George, Greene, Jackson, Perry and Wayne counties. The projects represent members in each of Singing River Electric's three geographic districts. Participation by SRE members in the pilot projects will give the board of directors direction on future broadband expansion to other areas.

- SRE's Brewer substation area is projected to receive SR Connect broadband service in late September or early October 2021.\*
- Parts of SRE's Aleco substation area in the Vestry community is projected to receive SR Connect broadband service in mid-to-late November 2021.\*
- Part's of SRE's Agricola substation area is projected to receive SR
   Connect broadband service in late
   December 2021 or early January 2022.\*

Following two years of research, including input from SRE members and feedback from consultants and feasibility studies, Singing River Electric's board of directors in December 2020 agreed to launch fiber service in southeast Mississippi. The project includes a 400-mile fiber ring connecting all SRE substations and offices, as well as three fiber-to-the-home/business pilot projects. Future broadband expansion is dependent on the success of the pilot project areas, one in each SRE district.



In 2019, Mississippi legislators passed and the Governor signed the Mississippi Broadband Enabling Act, which allows electric co-ops in the state to provide electricity and high-speed internet to members.



The pandemic brought many behavioral changes to protect our health. One of these was distance learning and working from home, which quickly made high-speed internet an essential service for all.



SRE members had a second vote in 2020. On October 9, 96% of the membership voted in person, online or by proxy in favor of changing our Certificate of Incorporation to allow SRE to provide fiber service.

## MAKING HERITAGE MATTER

Without electric co-ops electrifying communities across America, many of our local economies simply would not exist. We create jobs, fuel growth, support communities, and power lives and local economies.



In February 2020, Halter Marine, which is served by SRE in Jackson County, expanded in 2020 creating 100 new jobs and investing \$10 million.



In August 2020, Rolls Royce expanded its operations served by SRE in Jackson County and created 24 new high-paying jobs while investing \$30 million.



RespirTek received a Cooperative Competes grant from SRE's wholesale provider Cooperative Energy for a project that created 25 new jobs with an investment of \$1.5 million.
