

be required. A \$1,000.00 minimum charge in aid to construction will be required for all three-phase line extensions.

B. For Line Extension Upgrades from Single Phase to Three Phase - For service upgrades from single phase or B phase to three-phase electric service or single phase to B phase, a non-refundable contribution in aid to construction may be required based on an engineering cost of service and feasibility study. There is a \$2,000 minimum charge for all three-phase conversions.

Temporary installations

All line extensions to serve temporary installations will require a non-refundable contribution in aid to construction equal to the “up and down” cost of the facility.

Other terms

A. Any line extension requiring a land survey will be passed through to the member.

B. For PT and CT installations, a nonrefundable contribution in aid to construction of \$700.00 per PT and \$300.00 per CT, this does not include primary metering applications.

C. Electric vehicle service upgrade charges will fall under applicable upgrade charges.

Payment of contribution in aid to construction

All contribution in aid to construction should be paid before new construction is begun.

Taxes

Billing under this schedule shall be subject to any applicable state and municipal sales tax.

Area Coverage Policy

Singing River Electric’s policy in relation to the extension of overhead electric service

The policy of the Cooperative is to extend overhead service to prospective member(s) in all areas within the service territory of the Cooperative under the following terms and conditions at the Cooperative’s regularly established rates and minimums that are fair and equitable which promote safe, adequate, and uniform service to all members.

Calculation of contribution in aid to construction

When applicable, the field engineer will complete an engineering design cost estimate form which will include the member’s required contribution in aid to construction based on an engineering cost of service study and/or feasibility study. Both a Cooperative representative and the member may sign the design cost estimate form. The member may retain their copy of the design cost estimate form.



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Right-of-way easements

All members of the Cooperative are required to furnish, at no cost to the Cooperative, right-of-way easements (ROW) over, under, or across all property between the Cooperative's present facilities and applicant's service location.

For service to members where it is necessary for the Cooperative to purchase ROW from any landowner, the member will be required to pay in advance to the Cooperative for the total cost of ROW including tree damages.

If the Cooperative is required to exercise the right of eminent domain to obtain the necessary ROW, the member will be required to reimburse the Cooperative for any all legal and court approved expenses.

For single-phase overhead service, a ROW of 30 feet is required. For three-phase overhead service, a ROW of 40 feet is required.

ROW may be shared with city, county, state, or other utilities whenever possible.

Right of way

It is the responsibility of the member to initially clear the ROW for the installation of electric service. The ROW must be cleared of dirt piles, trees, stumps, construction materials, and equipment, etc. for the Cooperative's equipment and personnel to be able to access ROW before installation of Cooperative facilities can begin.

The member can choose to clear the ROW or have the Cooperative use its regular contractors to clear the ROW. If the Cooperative clears the ROW, a non-refundable contribution in aid to construction will be required. A charge of \$4.00/ft. will be assessed for the Cooperative to clear the ROW with a \$300.00 minimum charge.

Single-phase line extensions

The Cooperative will provide single-phase overhead electric service to permanent residential dwellings which are permanently occupied including mobile homes and tiny/manufactured homes (not seasonal or camps, etc.) and commercial accounts under the terms and conditions set forth below:

A. For Line Extensions Less than 1,000 Feet from the Cooperative's Primary Facilities - The Cooperative will provide single-phase overhead electric service without any contribution in aid to construction based on the most feasible service route for the Cooperative for services located within 1,000 feet of the Cooperative's primary facilities and accessible by the Cooperative's service and construction trucks.

B. For Line Extensions Greater than 1,000 Feet from the Cooperative's Primary Facilities - For single-phase electric service extensions greater than 1,000 feet accessible by the Cooperative's service and construction trucks, a non-refundable contribution in aid to construction of \$4.50 per foot for the extension in excess of 1,000 feet will be required.

C. Route Feasibility - If the member requests a service route that is different from the most feasible service route for the Cooperative, a non-refundable contribution in aid to construction equal to the Cooperative's increased cost may be required based on an engineering cost of service study.

Other single-phase line extensions

The Cooperative will provide single-phase overhead electric service to other structures under the terms and conditions set forth below:

Other structures include, but are not limited to, barns, pumps, houseboats, hunting camps, recreational vehicles, meter poles, signs, and seasonal loads.

A. For Line Extensions Less than 400 Feet from the Cooperative's Primary Facilities - Service to other structures located within 400 feet of the Cooperative's primary facilities and is accessible by the Cooperative's service and construction trucks will be provided without any contribution in aid to construction.

B. For Line Extensions Greater than 400 Feet from the Cooperative's Primary Facilities - For service to other structures requiring a line extension greater than 400 feet and is accessible by the Cooperative's service and construction trucks, a contribution in aid to construction in the amount of \$4.50 per foot for the extension in excess of 400 feet will be required.

C. For Line Extensions not Accessible by the Cooperative's Service and Construction Trucks - For service to other structures requiring an extension of line that is not accessible by the Cooperative's service and construction trucks, a non-refundable contribution in aid to construction equal to the total cost of providing electric service may be required based on an engineering cost of service study.

Residence classification

Homestead exemption may be used to determine if permanent dwelling is classified as primary or seasonal residence.

Three-phase line extensions

The Cooperative will provide overhead electric service to commercial and industrial members under the terms and conditions set forth below:

A. For All New Three-Phase Line Extensions - For electric service to commercial and industrial members requiring a line extension of the Cooperative's primary three-phase facilities, a non-refundable contribution in aid to construction based on an engineering cost of service and feasibility study for the extension will
